The Tunisian flag was originally adopted between 1831 and 1835, making Tunisia's flag one of the world's oldest flags. However, the Tunisian flag wasn't legislated constitution until 1959, after Tunisia had gained independence from France on March 20, 1956. The current version of the Tunisian flag was adopted on July 3, 1999.



National Flag of the USA

Country: United States Of America

erican Flag Description:

The flag of the United States of America consists of 13 alternating horizontal stripes of equal width - seven are red and six are white. The top and bottom stripes on the American flag are red. In the top left corner of the flag there is a dark blue rectangle which has 50 white, fivepoint stars on it. The stars are arranged in nine horizontal rows.

The 13 stripes represent the 13 original colonies of the US: Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Maryland. Massachusetts, New Hampehire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina and Virginia. The 50 stars represent the individual states that make up the nation. Popular history states the red of the flag represents valor, white stands for liberty or purity and blue represents justice, loyalty and perseverance. These meanings are unofficial though.


The current American Bag was adopted on July 4, 1060. The American flag originated in the mid-10th century from flags used at the time of the American War of Independence with Britain. Congress officially set the design of the American flag in June 1777, stating that it should be 13 alternating red and white stripes, with 13 white stars on a blue field as these were 13 original member states in the newly formed Union. As new states remostates on a country a new star and stripe were added to the American flag. In 1918, the American flags design was changed to the original one of 15 stripes. Any new states were now represented by a white star only and would be added to the American flag on July 4th of the year they joined. Up until 1918, there was no specific pattern for the stars to follow and this led to a few different designs until the president stated they should be placed in parallel rows. The last star, representing Hawaii was added was in 1960, and it became the 17th. version of the American flag. Like many of the worlds other old flags, there are many legends and myths that surround the flag of the United States of America.


Interesting American Flag Facts: The American flag is often called "the stars and stripes" or "Old Glory.


The American flag has influenced the design of many other of the world's flago. Old and tattered flags are supposed to be burned in a simple ceremony once they become unacceptable for flying. However, may people have taken to public displays of burning the American flag to show their displeasure with the country.



In an attempt to sensitize kids and make them know about the American culture, we worked on a document entitled American symbols using the KWL approach, and then we tried to see their counter parts in the Tunisian culture.

On November 1st, a group of students at the *Space of Wisdom Sfax* had a Halloween party. They prepared a pumpkin then dressed in ghostly costumes and knocked on other groups' doors. They talked to them about the history and significance of Halloween, holding bags open to catch the candy or other goodies that their peers would drop in.

Tree Planting Day: First Sunday of November





Access students learned about the history of the Tree Planting Day and how the idea of setting aside a day to plant trees originated in the United States in 1800 as a reaction to the concern about rapid deforestation. As the situation is not different in Tunisia, Access students decided to organize a campaign to sensitize other students about the importance of the tree in our life. Preparing for the Tree Planting Day, Access students arranged a clean-up campaign then, On Sunday November 3rd, planted an olive tree with their Access teachers. Asked about their choice, Access students Ameni Kachouri and Hassen Elhor said: "we chose an olive tree because it symbolizes peace, determination and wisdom."

Access is Altruism and Volunteerism

Access students planned a visit to *Aoulèdouna*, an association which takes care of mentally-retarded kids, mainly those with Down syndrome. They were very enthusiastic to meet these people. They enjoyed chatting, playing, singing and dancing with them. It was an opportunity to have fun and to know more about this association and these children and teenagers.



Access students also volunteered to take care of the asociation's garden and helped the children to decorate the place. This visit has changed the students' attitudes to mentally -retarded and has motivated them to seek more opportunities to help others.



ACTIVITIES FOR THE PREVENTION AND MITIGATION OF HIV/AIDS



On December 1st, Access students celebrated the World Aids Day. They met at The Space of Wisdom and wrote down their questions about HIV. Doctor Maha Yahia was invited to give a presentation in English and answered the students' questions. This prevention-focused training was intended on the one hand to provide students with the necessary knowledge to protect individuals and communities from HIV/AIDS. On the other hand, to increase students' awareness of the causes and conditions which lead to the spread of HIV. It was also an opportunity to interact with the doctor and know more about this epidemic and its impact on society. The students also enjoyed a question-answer game that was used to check what they have learnt.









The main objective of involving students in human rights project has been to gain knowledge of "rights and responsibilities" and to be able to define and recognize those rights and responsibilities. Access teachers believe that students will be positively empowered by engaging them in different human rights projects.



Therefore, active participation will ultimately strengthen their determination to become good citizens and to make better lives for themselves, their community and the world. Along with this line of thought, Access Students were involved in different workshops which intended to gather information about children's rights. Finally, students decided to produce something they could use to draw people's attention to these rights and to focus on their value. Every pupil wrote on his/her hand what he/she considered as a crucial right.

A visit to the book fair





During the show different performances were enacted in front of the Access teachers, the students' family members and friends. Such performances were met by the audience's appreciation who applauded on many occasions for the sense of seriousness and innovation they felt in the show which included a play about human rights in which the students voiced their deep awareness of the importance of respecting human rights in society. Another play was about 'Citizenship' in which the students sensitized their peers about the importance of being a good citizen. 'The Chair' was another play based on physical silent discourse in which the students summarized the story of dictatorship and revolution in Tunisia.

Apart from the plays, the students showed their talents in playing instruments, singing and dancing. The show was a good opportunity for Access students to strengthen their voices as future leaders and send important messages of citizenship, democracy and togetherness.

The Access Alumni participation added value to the show which ended with a song "we are the children of the world we are the children of peace! We are the children of the world" Access Alumni shared their experience with the New Access students, they sang and danced together.

Dr. Salwa Mrabet-Abid said: "I have enjoyed watching the new Access students in action. I can see the spectacular improvement of the students' proficiency level in English.

The show was a great opportunity for the new Access students to share with the Access Alumni, their parents, friends and teachers what they have learned in three months and they exhibited in a talented manner what the concept of leadership, citizenship and Human rights mean to them. A Visit To The Elderly Home








January 2014:


Access students decided to gather more

One of the projects that inspired the students and motivated them was the Mother's Day Project .

Discovering

Step 1: The pupils look at a photo of two women and are asked if they have any information about them.



This photo encouraged the pupils to guess and try to discover who the women were and why their photo was uploaded to the internet. It raised their curiosity and made them more interested to the topic.

Step 2: A competition is launched and the pupils are divided into groups of three and are given a list of links to surf in and to gather the maximum of details about these two famous women. Each time a group finds an important detail they write it on a board. Finally, when time is up the

pupils meet and try to share the information they got.



Some of the important

words the pupils wrote were: mother's day- America – memorial – second Sunday – May- campaign – President Woodrow Wilson – mother and daughter...



The pupils are exposed to a word cloud about The Mother's Day to help them remember the different details they came across while searching about the famous American women Ann and her daughter Anna. They tried to use the words to produce correct sentences. For example: "Anna Jarvis wanted to honor her mother through the Mother's Day." Another pupil added to the sentence by saying ": "Anna Jarvis wanted to honor her mother and all the world's mothers through the Mother's Day."

Step 3: The pupils watch a video about the history of the Mother's Day. It's about Anna Jarvis workplace home. http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=KsttKrfyk0o




Speaking activity-->creating a new board game



One-week skills development training with 'More than Words' Group

Learning, sharing and leading





For four hours each morning during the week of June 23-27, More Than Words: Consulting in English - Tunis branch, along with their 7 American University Student interns, held an American-style English camp with Space of Wisdom's 60 Access students. All the daily activities revolved around each day's theme about building character as follows: Monday: Honest is the best policy.

If I lose my honor, I lose myself; Tuesday: **Respect** is understanding that someone or something has value; Wednesday: **Compassion** is being aware of others' distress and the desire to physically help them; Thursday: **Forgiveness** is a gift that erases the wrong and sets you free; and Friday: **Responsibility** is taking care of what is important to you, others, and the world around you. The students were broken up into three teams. Each day, the whole group met together to sing some silly songs, learn the daily memory bit, see a skit or video, and do a team challenge.

After that, they split up and rotated for the next few hours to: 1) **Learn it!** where they reread the skit or video history and learned new vocabulary, 2) **Use it!** where they discussed how to apply it their lives and the challenges they face, and 3) **Create it!** where they worked on a craft that gave them a souvenir to remember that day's character.

Finally, they all returned to large group where team points where given, the skit was re-enacted out by the students, more silly songs were sung, and high-fives were given as everyone departed for the day.

It was truly a memorable opportunity for both sides.

Khadija, one of the Access students, commented on one of the initial Facebook posts, "We spent with you nice time, you're great! We love you really! The first day was unforgettable."











Access Program Summer Camp: July 2014

For the first time this year, ACCESS students from the Space of Wisdom held their summer camp in SAADA residence in Bizerte from the 6th to the 12th of July. It was a good opportunity for all the participants to practice and improve their English as well as enjoy themselves in a very friendly and relaxed atmosphere.

The **organization** was carefully thought of. The staff used to have a daily meeting and talk about the day's happenings and prepare future events and activities. During the morning session of the first day Access students took an **evaluation test**

The students were divided into four different groups according to their scores. Each group was composed of fourteen to sixteen memberswith similar abilities and mastery of the English language. This procedure was extremely useful as it allowed us to form homogeneous groups and work in good conditions.



We have opted for the system of swapping groups so that by the end of the week the four teachers had seen all the participants on three different occasions. This system was an opportunity for the students to have a chance to meet different trainers and get familiar with different approaches and teaching techniques.

B/ Program organization, content and planning:

The working days were divided into three major periods but all the time, we had to bear in mind the fact that: "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy" so we made sure to include fun and entertainment in most if not all the activities.

The morning sessions: We included two ninety-minute sessions in the mornings from 9.30 am to 11.00 am and from 11.30 am to 1.00 pm with group swapping after break. These periods were reserved to teaching. We tried to make it student based and giving a chance to everybody to take part in discussions. The emphasis was put on speaking, sometimes written support and visuals (short texts or proverbs or pictures) were used as a springboard to enhance conversation. Vocabulary and grammar were implicitly included.

The afternoon sessions (from 3.00 pm to 6.00 pm) were occasions to take part in competitions and games related to the topics of the day (successful teamwork building/planning group work/ overcoming obstacles/good leadership / problem solving / winning spirit) These games and competitions were performed under the supervision of the trainers on the beach, around the swimming pool and in the water. They were also occasions to practice and rehearse for a role play)

The evenings(9.00 pm to midnight) were occasions for students to perform in front of their fellow audience and present something they worked on during the day. It could be a song, a dialog, a role play, a sketch, a riddle, a poem, or a game. There were also moments for a more passive type of exposure to English language and relaxation with a TV program, an English film or a world cup football match. And to make the enjoyment complete there was also another type of animation with a D.J and his nightly 90-minute show till midnight: time for music and dance to the beat of their favorite pop songs.

Extra Activities

During our meetings with the students, we have constantly encouraged them to contribute to the Camp magazine with stories, riddles, poems, pictures, caricatures, jokes and also share their comments and suggestions about the different activities.

Another activity worth mentioning and which the students liked very much was **the painting activity**. The director invited a famous painter in Bizerte and under his guidance and supervision the students succeeded in producing four great paintings. To everybody's surprise they were masterpieces and we all had great moments of joy and pleasure. Some students discovered hidden skills and talents in them.

Last but not least, on one occasion we took all the participants on a guided bus tour around Bizerte to offer the participants good panoramic views of the city followed by a walk along the narrow and winding roads of the old town and on the banks of the old harbor. The walk included a visit to the market place, the old harbor, the Spanish fortress, the mobile bridge, and other monuments and historic places.

Students in my class practiced and improved their presentation skills. They also learned about the importance of non-verbal communication and the use of visuals to help captivate the crowd and keep their attention.

Also, students learned about different governmental systems and discussed what they thought the role of government is in the lives of its citizens. As their teacher, it was wonderful to watch these students work together in teams to inspire one another to build the best presentation. While not everyone will be allowed to vote in the elections set for later this year due to the age restriction, they will be more attentive to specific issues as well as the manner in which these issues are presented in the coming months. Their



energy and excitement were contagious. As they inspired each other, they also inspired me and left me feeling very hopeful for future generations of Tunisia.
